Feeding Friends & Neighbors In Need: We supplied 12,160,572 pounds of food to more than 200 charitable feeding programs to help reach the estimated 149,550 food-insecure residents in our 11-county service area. During FY23, we held a total of 94 small to large sized mobile pantries. Out of those mobile pantries, 5 were Kids Harvest and 5 were through our Healthcare Partnership Initiative. This initiative has grown to include partnerships with 10 healthcare providers with 14 locations in North Alabama, three of which are located in rural populations. In partnership with agency partners, we have developed and implemented a clinic referral system with prescription pads and a guide to resources in the community that the clinic serves.





Park-it Market: We now have a mobile produce market, stocked with produce that we can take directly out into the community! The Park-it Market made its debut in August for a produce distribution for residents at Johnson Towers in Huntsville. In September, we partnered with Huntsville Family Health Clinic for a distribution at their clinic and had almost 600 individuals come through and pick out produce. We are excited to have this out on the road in FY 2024!

New Partnerships: In March, we launched the first on-site food pantry at the HEALS Clinic, located at Martin Luther King Jr. Elementary School in Huntsville. The clinic sees around 188 patients monthly in North Huntsville and to date; we have distributed 2,395 pounds of food. The staff at the HEALS Clinic have expressed that their patients are greatly benefiting from having access to the pantry, and they would like to establish two additional on-site food pantries at their clinics located at Morris Elementary and Sonnie Hereford Elementary in Huntsville.

Food Insecure Seniors: Additionally, food boxes designed for low-income senior residents were distributed throughout 7 counties to 1,236 of our neighbors who are experiencing chronic food insecurity. Volunteers, city employees, property managers, local businesses and grocery stores all played a role in helping us get food to those who needed it.

<u>Backpack Programs</u>: We partner with companies, churches and civic groups to provide two-day, supplemental meal kits to children who otherwise would go without food over the weekend when they do not have access to the free meals served at school. This year we helped supply food to 6,561 students. These programs provided 196,312 pounds of food to children and meant students arrived to school on Monday ready and able to learn without the distraction of hunger.



<u>The Hiatt Loan Fund</u>: The fund served as the initial startup funding for the North Alabama Revolving Loan Fund to provide micro-loans to family farmers and entrepreneurs who create jobs and greater access to healthy food choices in underserved communities. These borrowers would not qualify for a conventional loan. The fund is operated by our non-profit partner, Neighborhood Concepts.

Farm Food Collaborative: The Collaborative is North Alabama's first local food hub helping family farmers sell locally grown fruits and vegetables to public schools, workplace cafeterias and grocery stores. The program supports thriving family farms and creates easy access to fresh, healthy foods for the broadest spectrum of residents. The Collaborative ensures fresh, local produce is available to schools, daycares, workplace cafeterias and grocery stores across Alabama. We facilitated \$480,000 worth of sales on behalf of familyowned farms.








Food Distribution Report

During the 2022-2023 fiscal year, the Food Bank of North Alabama distributed more than 10 million meals to residents in North Alabama at risk of hunger through a network of more than 200 partner feeding programs.


